

From Pucklechurch to Pune...

Three Pucklechurch Guiders, Judith, Anne and myself together with Rangers, aged 16+, and other adult leaders travelled to Sangam, our World Centre in Pune, India. What a contrast to life in Pucklechurch!

Firstly there's the cacophony of noise; early morning parrots screeching, the mullah next door wailing full blast through a loudspeaker and the local ammunitions factory announcing shift changes with an old-fashioned very loud air raid siren.

Then the traffic. Oh the traffic! There's masses of it, going in every direction and all at the same time. Fortunately the Indians seem to be less stressed than us and there's no road rage, everyone gives way to one another, sometimes within a hairsbreadth but nevertheless we saw no accidents. Cows, water buffalo and stray dogs just add to the confusion and obviously the cows have right of way and can sit down in the middle of the traffic if they want to!

The main purpose of our visit was to take part in community service through various projects selected by our World Centre. There were 64 participants at Sangam and we worked in teams. Judith and her team were challenged with providing activities for boys of all ages at a school for the blind which took a lot of thought and discussion. However she found it most rewarding and was surprised at how dextrous the boys were and how quickly they learned.

Anne's project was very different. With her team she visited a waste collection service being pioneered by local women to help them realise their potential and earn their own money. She visited a smelly waste collection point, but also saw some surprisingly wealthy apartments with their own swimming pools. Here residents were being urged to sort their rubbish into wet and dry to make the collection service viable, and Anne's team distributed leaflets.

My team went into slum schools to teach action songs like the Hokey Cokey and to provide craft activities. The buildings were dingy and crumbling with peeling paint and far too many children in the room. The children were of mixed age and many wore government-provided uniform. All were spotlessly clean despite the monsoon weather outside and the shacks they lived in. We were very conscious of the gritty concrete floors as everyone has to take off their shoes and sit cross-legged on them. The children were delighted to see us, loved making things and didn't covet anything. A single bead or a pencil found was promptly returned.

In addition to the project we bought saris and learned how to wear them correctly, ate Indian food with our fingers, and learned about Indian culture. We rode in rickshaws and ancient, rickety buses. We visited teeming, vibrant markets and haggled for bargains.

After our Guiding programme ended we flew to Delhi and toured the sights, and then to Agra and the Taj Mahal which is as beautiful as depicted and certainly wondrous in its construction. After a final trip to a local market it was time to return home. We all now appreciate far more the things we took for granted. It was such a worthwhile trip and one we'll always remember.

Rogue Traders in South Glos

South Gloucestershire Trading Standards would like to reiterate the warning given recently to residents to be extra vigilant when dealing with unexpected callers at the front door.

Officers are aware that rogue traders are currently operating in the area and are offering to carry out, amongst other things, paving/driveway and roofing work.

Rogue trading incidents such as these are also linked to distraction burglaries, so we would ask that residents please look out for your neighbours, family and friends as well and report any suspicious activity.

There are a number of steps residents can take to try and avoid becoming the victim of a rogue trader.

- Be wary of traders who cold call and the deals they offer you – it is unusual for genuine tradesmen to need to cold call to drum up work!
- Do not allow any unknown and unexpected visitor into your home. If possible, try to deal with them through a window or use a door chain.
- Ensure your front and back doors are closed and locked if your attention is elsewhere.
- If you agree to work you are afforded cancellation rights by law, and these should be given to you in writing. It is a criminal offence not to provide these in certain circumstances.
- If you are unhappy or feel intimidated by the visitor – shut the door and call the police.

Pucklechurch Parish Council Chairman's Report - August 2014 Parish Council Community Grants

The Council has confirmed that its Community Grant Scheme will be available to applicants again this year. Application forms are available from the Parish Clerk at: parish.council@pucklechurch.org or may be downloaded from the Parish Council website at: www.pucklechurchparishcouncil.weebly.org

This year the deadlines are as follows:

31 October 2014 - for applicants who wish to have forms checked before final submission

30 November 2014 - final application submission.

The Council expects to receive reports from all successful recipients of grants, on how the money has been spent and the benefit it has provided.

Please note we are still awaiting reports from applicants who were successful in the last round and would like to remind those applicants these should be submitted as soon as possible.

Planning

We continue to be involved in planning applications and have attended South Gloucestershire Council (SGC) planning site visits and committee meetings to present parish views in person. The views we express are available to see in the Parish Council minutes and on SGC's website. We have also been making comments on SGC's draft Policies, Sites & Places Development Plan Document. Links to all of these can be found via the Parish Council website (as shown above)

Hill View Road

I am very disappointed to say that we are still awaiting the report from South Gloucestershire Council. We are currently working with residents of Hill View Road to understand the issues that have been occurring over the years with regard to excess water. We have reminded SGC of their commitment to those residents.

Multi Use Path

The Council fully supports the development of the proposed multi-user link from Pucklechurch to Shortwood Hill. The works have been split into a number of phases and consultation for "Phase 1" has taken place.

It has been decided to work from Shortwood up and there have been some concerns about leaving Policeman's Hill corner to last. The view from the project team is that if the most important part is completed first there will be little desire to spend money on less important sections. The total costs for the link are in excess of £300k. For more information see:

First Bus Service:

We have been made aware that First Bus are reducing non-profit making routes in Marshfield. There is no plan yet to review our service but now that SGC grants have been removed, services will only be operated on a non-loss basis. It's a case of "Use it or lose it".

Oaktree Avenue:

South Gloucestershire Council have decided to offer two plots of land for sale for development at the top of Oaktree Avenue. The area designated as village green has been excluded. To find out more see:

This time of year we hear a lot about marathons and half marathons around the country. From 1994 to 1997, Pucklechurch was the venue for the 'Great Western Ten Mile Road Race' with the Community Centre being used as the changing room before and after the race and also for the presentation of prizes. There must have been at least 350 runners with quite a number coming from the continent and also a Bristol Olympic champion by the name of Nick Rose, who had won the race several times.

The race circuit started in Hill View Road, on through Abson, then bearing left for Doynton and coming back along Rookery Lane to Pucklechurch and repeating the same circuit a second time, finishing back again in Hill View. This race is now the Bristol Half Marathon with around 12,000 taking part.

Top up your oil tank in early autumn.

Local charity West of England Rural Network is advising householders to top up their domestic oil tanks before expected price rises in the colder months of autumn and winter. The charity runs a community oil buying scheme which aims to save local people money on their oil bills by placing a collective order once a month.

The charity is currently offering a limited number of FREE memberships to the scheme (normally £20) to anyone over 70 living in the West of England (Bath and North East Somerset, Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire), thanks to funding awarded by Quartet Community Foundation.

Scheme co-ordinator Jill Baker says "oil prices tend to rise in autumn and winter as demand increases. By placing a single large order we can negotiate with suppliers and everyone pays less." Members of the scheme can order as little as 500 litres, as infrequently as they choose, and still pay the negotiated price. The member oil price in July was 49.8p per litre (plus VAT at 5%). The usual annual membership fee is £20 for households, £30 for community buildings and £100 for businesses.

Free Training for Carers

Carers Support Centre is running free training for carers this autumn.

Three out of five of us will be a carer at some point in our lives, but how many of us know what support is out there, or would even think to ask? Many carers don't even see themselves as carers. They feel they are just doing what anyone else would in the same situation; looking after a relative or friend who is ill, frail or disabled. But taking on a caring role can mean facing a life of isolation, frustration, ill health and depression.

Carers Support Centre works locally to support unpaid family carers. Services include a specialist information and advice line; help with forms and accessing local services; counselling; training courses and groups; preparing for hospital discharge; getting a break; and the Carers Emergency Card.

This autumn they are running FREE training courses for carers:

Everyday First Aid – Monday 22 September 10 -12, Fishponds.

If you are caring for someone who has dementia, is elderly, disabled or is affected by mental illness you will know that they are at an increased risk of having a medical emergency. This course can help you to learn simple first aid skills that could help if things suddenly went wrong.

Caring for those in the Later Stages of Life – 5 week course on Wednesdays 1-3pm, Southmead Fire Station (starts Weds 3 Sept). For anyone caring for a family member or friend living with a life limiting illness or near the end of life.

Understanding Dementia – 5 week course on Mondays 1-3pm, Fishponds (starts Mon 13 Oct). For anyone caring for a family member or friend suffering from dementia. For more information about training courses or other services contact:
